




# EARLY CHILDHOOD ANNUAL REPORT

### Dear Friends.

My name is Elena. I am a single parent of two handsome boys Carlyle and Enzo. I moved to Shelton about 5 years ago when my son, Carlyle was only 1. After talking to my aunt, she told me to look into a program called TEAM Head Start after hearing wonderful things.

I am so thankful I listened to her. I went down to the Ansonia location and spoke to a Family Support Specialist who helped me apply for enrollment. After some time, I received the best news of my life. I was off the waiting list and my son had a spot at the Shelton Grove location. Prior to him starting, the teaching staff met one on one with me to go over program information and learn about my son. What a fantastic way to answer any cares or concerns. I don't trust anyone with my babies but bringing them to TEAM, all of my worries went right out the window. The teachers and staff are welcoming, warm, and always ready to help and listen to any concerns you may have.

Carlyle had made leaps and bounds with the program. Not only could he spell his name, they helped me potty train him. What a great feeling it is knowing your child's teacher's love your children like their own. His social & emotional skills increased and his academics went up as well. As Carlyle was aging out of the program, his teachers and staff made this transition very easy providing everything you needed to move into kindergarten. After having my second son, Enzo, he was placed in an Early Head Start classroom. I was very nervous as he was only 1½, however the staff took great care of my baby helping him and myself transition into the EHS classroom. Shortly after enrolling, Enzo failed his hearing screening. The Health Coordinator and Behavioral Health Coordinator worked with me to assist me in getting Enzo services. His teacher even taught him sign language! Come to find out my son needed tubes in both ears and a tongue tie release. I am forever grateful as I don't know if I would have identified my son's needs so young.

Shortly after Enzo enrolled, I applied and became a substitute teacher. The Head Teacher was very welcoming and extremely helpful throughout my training. After talking to a few parents, I was encouraged to join the Parent Policy Council. At the time I had no idea what I was getting myself into but I was all in to try something new. The Policy Council is all about ensuring parents are fully informed on every aspect of the program and we make program decisions together.

Not only do I get to work alongside the amazing teaching staff but also the influential management staff as well. I have completed a program called Circle of Security twice while at TEAM. I get to work with these beautiful babies & children everyday. They teach me that it's okay to do anything I set my mind to. Not only has the teaching staff and management staff taught me a lot of things, I get to go home and apply that with my own children. Being a part of TEAM makes me a better version of myself. The staff will help you with any and everything you need--even a quick hug when times are hard. I know I have a family with TEAM and I don't know where I would be without them. Thank you, TEAM for all of your support.







### **Birth to Five School Readiness Goals**

#### **Approaches to Learning**

- 1. Children will develop emotional, behavioral, and cognitive self-regulation.
- Children will show an interest in varied topics and activities, an eagerness to learn, creativity and independence within the classroom.

#### **Social Emotional Development**

- Children will be able to express, recognize, and respond to emotions.
- 4. Children will develop secure attachments with their caregivers and positive peer relationships.
- 5. Children will exhibit prosocial and cooperative behavior.

#### Language and Literacy

- Children will develop expressive language with increasing complexity. Dual language learners will initially develop in their home language, then in English.
- Children will develop receptive language with increasing complexity. Dual language learners will
  initially develop in their home language, then in English.
- Children will begin to understand and eventually use print as a meaningful and organized symbolic system of communication. Dual language learners will initially understand and use print in their home language, then in English.

#### Cognition


- Children will begin to use math concepts during daily routines and experiences.
- Children use all of their senses to investigate their environment and discover what objects do, how living things behave, and how things work.
- Children will increase their critical thinking skills, be able to apply past knowledge, and become aware of their own thinking.

- 12. Children will engage in self-care routines and exhibit healthy, safe, and nutritious habits.
- 13. Children will develop large gross motor and overall coordination skills.
- 14. Children will develop fine motor skills and overall hand eye coordination.


Developed from the five essential domains in the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (HSELOF) and the Connecticut Early Learning & Development Standards (CT ELDS), TEAM's School Readiness goals focus on a growth trajectory in support of children ages birth to five. TEAM's early childhood program provides a flexible, developmentally appropriate curriculum that allows teachers to plan learning opportunities based on the individual strengths, needs, interests and social-emotional competencies of each child. Ongoing observations and assessments provide child specific data that is used to set individualized goals for each enrolled child as well as provide the program with an overall understanding of child progress, needed classroom supports and staff professional development.


